For the second year in a row, COVID continued to impact the individuals and families in our service area.

The essential services such as Meals On Wheels, Emergency Housing, Emergency Utility Assistance, Head Start & Early Head Start and Veteran Services provided did not stop.

Our Annual report highlights the outcomes of the programs that we offer.

On behalf of myself, and CAAM's Board of Directors, we appreciate your ongoing support as we continue to serve people the best we can.

CAAM is a non profit organization that serves Marquette and Alger Counties. The SSVF and ESG programs serve additional counties to impact 15 counties in total.

The mission of CAAM is to improve the economic security and well-being of individuals and families in Alger and Marquette Counties by providing education, housing and human service programs through community collaborations.

Supportive Services for Veteran Families



Veterans who received services in Marquette and Alger Counties.



Total number of Veterans who received services across all 15 counties.



Additional services provided to Veterans in Marquette and Alger Counties:

- 11 Veterans were provided with Emergency Housing Assistance in a hotel
- 4 Veterans were provided with additional food assistance while in the hotel
- 5 Veteran families were provided with housing supplies for their new homes
- 2 Veterans were provided with car repair assistance to help locate housing and find or find and retain work.

COVID brought many challenges in trying to house Veterans over the 20-21 year. The SSVF program staff had to think creatively and find ways to house Veterans safely and quickly. One of the most notable achievements was being able to house two Veterans together as roommates who were considered hardest to serve. This not only provided a safe place for these Veterans to live, but also provided a sense of companionship. They are still currently living together and have made huge strides since entering the SSVF program.

Community Nutrition Services

During the 2020-2021 Program Year:

- 537 Homebound, frail seniors were served 88,118 meals along with a wellness check with each delivery.
- 196 seniors were served 14,203 congregate meals
- 568 low income seniors received 147,000 pounds of staple foods from the CSFP program.
- An average of 814 families each month visited their local pantries to pick up a box of emergency food through the TEFAP program.
- 9 volunteers and 9 Meals on Wheels participants enjoyed virtually cooking and eating together in the Boxes, Bags, and Buddies joint project with UPCAP. Participants learned together about nutrition and cooking skills, and decreased their isolation and loneliness.










